Organization of the San Diego County Plan for Serving Expelled Students 2012-2015

The Three-year Expulsion Plan has been organized as follows:

- 1. **Pages 3 5 (white)** are the introduction, which discusses the law and an overview of the plan.

INTRODUCTION

Education Code – 49826

Each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, shall develop a plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in that county. The plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the County Board of Education.

The plan shall enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils, identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps. The plan shall also identify alternative placement for pupils who are expelled and placed in district Community Day School programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

Each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the local school districts, shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the county plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in the county no later than June 30, 2003, and shall submit a triennial update to the plan to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, including the outcome data pursuant to Section 48916.(1) on June 30th thereafter.

Education Code – 48916.(1)

At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion, but only the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose in the annual Budget Act or other legislation, or both.

San Diego County Plan

Educational programs within San Diego County provide numerous opportunities for students who are in need of traditional and/or alternative educational programs. Individual school districts offer a broad spectrum of service and the San Diego County Office of Education offers additional options, this combination provides a continuum of alternatives to expelled students.

A student whose behavior has resulted in expulsion is given a rehabilitation plan that is designed by the district of residence. This plan may involve one or more of the options outlined in the 3-year plan [see matrices on Education Alternatives and Services for expelled students located in the yellow (pages 16-26) and green (pages 125-134) sections]. A student who is simply in the need of an educational alternative may also access these programs through a District and/or County referral process.

There were 4 major gaps that were identified in the 2003-2006, 2006-2009, and 2009-2012 Plan for Serving Expelled Students. During those time periods, several strategies were proposed and implemented to address these gaps. There was a fifth strategy added in the 2009-2012 Plan. These five gaps and the accompanying strategies are restated and or revised in the following pages 6 through 9 (**tan** colored section). Each gap and strategy is followed by a discussion of the implementation of the strategies outlined for filling those service gaps by responding to the questions:

- 1. a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles?
 - b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

The **blue** (pages 27 to 124) and **green** (pages 125-134) sections of this document provide an updated overview of the educational services that are available and strategies for improvement during the next three years.

Alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board are outlined in the **pink** section (page 10).

Finally, following the alternative placement **pink** section (page 10) is the **lavender** section (page 11) that contains a discussion of the articulation and coordination between school districts and with the county office of education in providing educational placements for expelled pupils.

As with the 2006-2009 and 2009-2012 County Plan for Serving Expelled Students, the 2012-2015 County Plan is signed by local district superintendents and the county superintendent of schools. As per California Department of Education and interpretation of the California Education Code there is no requirement to have the document returned for board action.

SAN DIEGO COUNTY AND DISTRICT GAPS AND STRATEGIES IN EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO EXPELLED STUDENTS

SAN DIEGO COUNTY AND DISTRICT GAPS AND STRATEGIES IN EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO EXPELLED STUDENTS

There are four major gaps that were identified in respect to providing educational services to expelled pupils for 2003-2006. Following each gap is the County/District strategies for addressing these gaps.

The Gap

1. Students who have failed their placement in district Community Day Schools or do not have a Community Day School must be referred to other district programs or to a County operated Community School. If the student fails the program or commits another expulsion type offense, there may not be any viable alternative remaining.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap:

- A. The San Diego County Office of Education will continue to provide educational services to eligible students placed in or referred to the "Court and Community School" program. Students may be referred to other Juvenile Court and Community Schools (JCCS) within the region where independent study is offered as an option.
- B. Districts will continue to use existing educational strategies and programs to meet the needs of expelled students.
- C. As approved by each local board, designated staff will reassess the appropriateness of each student's rehabilitation plan and will revise as necessary.
- D. Districts with the support and assistance of the County Office of Education will continue to explore collaborative alternatives to address this gap.

Discussion

- a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles? Yes, for the most part. However, there still are not enough regional offerings in certain areas of the county including rural and outlying areas. Since there is not a high need in these for expulsion placements even though inconvenient for the small number of students the current appears to be meeting the needs.
- b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

No additional strategies were implemented in this area.

The Gap

2. Students in grades one through six who are expelled do not have the same educational options available as do expelled youth who are in grades seven through twelve, due to the limited numbers of students who are expelled in these lower grades. These younger students cannot attend programs designed for middle and high school students. The numbers are growing, but generally are not enough to develop an elementary school classroom or program.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap:

A. The K-6 school districts will continue to offer available options, which may include the following:

Suspended expulsion with placement at the same school with the **Other Means of Correction** contract.

Suspended expulsion with placement at a different school within the same district with the **Other Means of Correction** contract.

Suspended expulsion with placement in a district operated opportunity school with the **Other Means of Correction** contract.

SDCOE will be offering limited options at one of the centrally located elementary community day schools.

(see page 92 for a sample Other Means of Correction contract)

Expulsion and placement in district-operated community day school where available.

Discussion

a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles?

Yes, however will need to continue their efforts in expanding maintaining the numbers and kind of intervention strategies used with elementary students.

b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

Districts have increased the number and kind of intervention strategies to prevent elementary students from being expelled.

The Gap

3. A full continuum of services is not available at each of the 66 62 sites operated by the County Office of Education. Some of the JCCS regions have more services to offer than others.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap:

- A. Districts will continue to use existing educational strategies and programs to meet the needs of expelled students.
- B. The Juvenile Court and Community Schools will meet with each individual SELPA annually to discuss programs and options for Special Education students who have been expelled. In addition, school districts will understand their role in transitioning a student to the JCCS programs.
- C. Guidance teams have been developed and are in place in each JCCS region within the county to implement the support for personal, social, career and academic domains.

- D. Every existing JCCS program now has a counselor and a parent family liaison to facilitate the conditions of their rehabilitation plan and to provide a more comprehensive continuum of services.
- E. JCCS has also hired a full time transition technician to manage the transition to and from local school districts.

Discussion

a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles?

Yes, however JCCS will expand their collaboration with local school districts through the individual SELPAs. Yes, however there is a growing number and range of students and a variety of needs of expelled students and therefore additional services such as counseling were needed to address the needs of students to assist them in meeting their rehabilitation plans. Additional services such as dropout prevention and outreach services are needed to support our highest risk of students to prevent them from dropping out during expulsion placements.

b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

Additional strategies were implemented, however, were not reflected in C-E of this section. In addition, Early Prevention Screening Diagnostic Teams (EPSDT) have been implemented by County Mental Health to assist in addressing counseling needs. Yes, however, more rRural districts are not provided the full array of services offered in more urban school districts. Students do not have transportation to obtain the needed services required to rehabilitate them.

- c. There have been significant changes to the funding structure.
- d. Support provided: a design for future services is needed.

The Gap

4. Placements may not always be available for expelled students in the nearest community school.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap:

- A. Other options may be available in other Juvenile Court and Community Schools.
- B. Districts will continue to collaborate with the Juvenile Court and Community Schools administration to expedite the registration process.
- C. Juvenile Court and Community Schools administration will work with district personnel, parents and partner agencies, to develop interim options for students, when placements are not available in the nearest community.

D. Juvenile Court and Community schools will make every effort to facilitate the opening of new programs in regions throughout the county. Local ordinances and building code regulations may cause delays, however.

Discussion

a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles?

Yes, some of the strategies have been extremely successful in particular, the collaboration, and communication with districts, parents and partnering agencies. This has facilitated efficient placement and transition of enrolling students in alternative sites when necessary.

b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

No additional strategies were identified.

The Gap

5. There is currently no single depository for student records available between districts and JCCS.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap:

A countywide data warehouse should be developed and implemented with current automation of student records concerning discipline and expulsion. This would automate acquisition of student records and data to facilitate placement in interim settings, JCCS sites and reinstatement back into the referring school districts. *

Discussion

a. Were the strategies successful? If not, what were the obstacles?

No, the strategy was not implemented and cannot be implemented due to budget constraints at this time.

b. What additional strategies were implemented? Were they successful?

There were no additional strategies implemented.

* This gap has been deleted in 2012-2015 because of budget cuts that prohibit the development of a single depository for student records. The county has implemented such a system for foster and incarcerated youth where districts and county probation, through an MOU, have access to student records.

ALTERNATIVE PLACEMENT

(For those expelled students who have been placed in a district community day school but who fail to meet the term or conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a continuing danger to the physical safety of district pupils or others)

Step I

The School District of residence continues to maintain responsibility for developing a rehabilitation plan for the student, referring the student to an appropriate educational setting, and ensuring that an educational program is provided either within or outside the school district.

Step II

Expelled students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of the district rehabilitation plan may be referred to a different district school, another district program, a district-operated Community Day School Program, or the San Diego County Office of Education Community School.

For expelled students who are referred to a San Diego County Office of Education Community School (which is a permissive program) an Individual Learning Plan will be developed with the students' parents and County Office of Education staff. Part of this plan will include a goal of returning to the school district of residence after the district expulsion term. If students are not successful in the County-operated program, they may be referred back to the district for possible review and re-placement.

REGIONAL ARTICULATION BETWEEN DISTRICTS AND THE COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION

The consistent regional articulation between districts and the San Diego County Office of Education has been occurring over the past eleven years. The County Office of Education provides bi-monthly Pupil Services administrators meetings for the 43 school districts including JCCS. The meeting is chaired by the Senior Director of Student Support Services of the County Office of Education and Director of Student Attendance, Safety & Well-Being. There is also representation from the administrative staff of the Juvenile Court and Community Schools (JCCS). These meetings provide opportunities for articulation and coordination between the county office and school districts on a bi-monthly basis. In addition, school districts can make contact with regionally identified JCCS staff for placements for expelled students.

San Diego County Office of Education Overview

The San Diego County Office of Education will continue to provide an educational option for expelled students. The Juvenile Court and Community Schools facilitate the students' completion of the rehabilitation plan, while responsibility for the long-term educational needs of the student remains with the referring district. This program is one that fits in the continuum of educational care as outlined. The philosophy of each individual school district affects how the San Diego County Office of Education Community School program will meet the needs of that particular school district. Some school districts use the San Diego County Office of Education program as an educational option for those students expelled under 49815.c, while others use these programs as placement alternative for other expelled students with one or both of the following findings: 1. "Other means of correction are not feasible or have repeatedly failed to bring about proper conduct" or 2. "Due to the nature of the act, the presence of the pupil causes a continuing danger to the physical safety of the pupil or others: (see 48915(b))."

The Community School is a permissive educational program that provides the local school districts with another educational option for their expelled youth.

The following pages outline the process for referral and referral forms that enable districts to access San Diego County Office of Education School programs.

Written notification is provided to the parent stating the reasons for denial of readmittance.

Districts will continue to use existing educational strategies and programs to meet the needs of expelled students.

2. Students in grades one through six who are expelled do not have the same educational options available as do expelled youth who are in grades seven through twelve, due to the limited numbers of students who are expelled in these lower grades. These younger students cannot attend the programs designed for middle and high school students. The numbers are growing, but generally are not enough to develop an elementary school classroom or program.

- Strategies for fulfilling those gaps in educational services or programs.
- Alternative placement for those expelled students who have failed their rehabilitation plan.

Educational programs with San Diego County provide numerous opportunities for students who are in need of traditional and/or alternative education programs. While Lakeside union School District offers a broad spectrum of service and the County Office of Education offers additional options, the combination provides a continuum of alternatives to expelled students.

A student whose behavior has resulted in expulsion is given a rehabilitation plan that is designed by the Lakeside Union School District. This plan may involve one or more of the options outlined. A student who is simply in need of an educational alternative may also access these programs through a District and/or County referral process.

The Lakeside Union School District will continue to provide an educational option for expelled students. This program is one that fits in the continuum of educational care as outlined. The Lakeside Union School District may use the San Diego County of Education Community School program as an educational option for expelled students and students who need a placement alternative.

The Lakeside Union School District offers expelled students in grades 7-8, one or more of the following options, depending on the nature of the offense and the specific Education Code violation. Actual referral to such a placement is made by the Lakeside Union School District Governing Board, with recommendation from the Administrative Review Committee.

- Suspended expulsion with placement on the same school campus with a behavior contract;

These younger students cannot attend the programs designed for middle school students. Since the numbers are almost non-existent, there are not enough students to develop an elementary school classroom or program.

The Lakeside Union School District offers expelled students in grades K-6 the following options, depending on the nature of the offense and the specific Education Code violation.

Educational programs within San Diego County provide numerous opportunities for students who are in need of traditional and/or alternative education programs. Individual school districts offer a broad spectrum of service, and the County Office of Education offers additional options for students. The combination of these services provides a broad continuum of alternatives for expelled students.

A student whose behavior has resulted in expulsion is provided with a rehabilitation plan that is designed by the district of residence. This plan may involve one or more of the options outlined. A student who is simply in need of an educational alternative may also access these programs through a District and/or County referral process.

Education Code 48926

Each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. The plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the county board of education.

The plan shall enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils, identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps. The plan shall also identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

Each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts, shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the county plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in the county no later than June 30, 1997, and shall submit a triennial update to the plan to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, including the outcome data pursuant to Section 48916.1, on June 30th thereafter.

Education Code 48916.1 (a)

At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion, but only to the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose in the annual Budget Act or other legislation, or both.

County Office of Education Overview

The San Diego County Office of Education will continue to provide educational options for expelled students. The philosophy of each individual school district affects how the San Diego County Office of Education Community School program will meet the needs of that particular school district. Some school districts use the San Diego programs as an educational option for those students expelled under a district "no-tolerance" policy, while others use this program as a student assistance or placement alternative. The Community School is a permissive educational program that provides the local school districts with another educational option for their expelled youth.

County Existing Educational Alternatives for Expelled Youth

The San Diego County Office of Education Court and Community School/Day Center program offers the following options for expelled youth:

- 1) daily educational programs that meet for 300 minutes per day in community classrooms;
- 2) contracted study programs that require students to complete a minimum of 20 hours of educational product and a minimum of 10 hours of in-class assignments;
- 3) contracted study programs that require students to complete a minimum of 20 hours of educational product.
- 4) Homeless programs
- 5) Teen Parent programs
- 6) Summit Community Schools located in districts throughout the county.

National School District Existing Educational Alternatives for Expelled Youth

The National School District offers the following options for expelled youth, depending on the specific offense and Education Code violation:

- 1) suspended expulsion with placement at the same school;
- 2) suspended expulsion with placement at a different school within the district;
- 3) suspended expulsion with placement in a home instruction program operated by the district;
- 4) expulsion with placement in a home instruction program operated by the district;
- 5) expulsion with referral to the San Diego County Office of Education Community Home Education Program.

Where there are sufficient numbers of expelled K-6 students in an area, a regional county operated Community School may be developed. It would be centrally located, and parents would be required to provide transportation to the program.

Actual referral to such placements will be made by the District Governing Board, with recommendations from the District Administrative Hearing Panel, School Attendance Review Board (SARB), or a similar District referral process.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT GAPS AND STRATEGIES IN EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR EXPELLED STUDENTS

The County and the National School District recognize there are major gaps that exist in the provision of educational services to expelled students. Some of these gaps are outlined below, with the strategies developed by the county and local districts to address each gap.

Gap 1. Students who have failed their placement in district operated programs may be referred to a county operated Community School.If the student fails that program or commits another expulsion type offense, there may not be any viable alternatives remaining.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap

The San Diego County Office of Education will continue to provide educational services to those eligible students placed or referred to the Community School program. A re-referral may be necessary.

The district will continue to use existing educational strategies and programs to meet the needs of expelled students. The district will not refer students to the county programs unless it has been determined that no local options are appropriate for the student.

Gap 2. Small school districts within San Diego County generally expel very few students during the course of a school year. So few students are expelled that having a special class or program for such students, located in the district, is not financially or geographically feasible.

County/District strategy for addressing this gap

A regional program may be developed to reflect geographical needs or limited numbers of students.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT ALTERNATIVE PLACEMENTS

The National School District, with the San Diego County Office of Education, will take the following steps for those expelled students who have been placed in a Community Day School but who fail to meet the terms or condition of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils.

Step I

The National School District will continue to maintain responsibility for developing a rehabilitation plan for the student, referring the student to an appropriate educational setting, and ensuring that an educational program is provided either within or outside the school district.

Step II

Expelled students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of the district rehabilitation plan may be referred to the San Diego County Office of Education Community School.

For expelled students who are referred to a San Diego County Office of Education Community School, an Individual Learning Plan will be developed with the students' parents and COE staff. Part of this plan will include a goal of returning these students to the National School District after the expulsion term. If students fail to meet their goals in the County operated program, they will be referred back to the district for possible review and placement in an alternative program or re-referral to the County for consideration of another available program.

County and District Gaps and Strategies in Educational Services

The County and the District recognizes there are gaps that exist in respect to providing educational services to all expelled students. They are listed below with strategies designed by County and local staff to address each gap.

1. Students who have failed their placement in district operated programs may be referred to a County operated Summit/Community School. If the student fails this program or commits another expulsion type offense, there may not be any viable alternatives available.

County/District strategy to address this gap:

- ➤ The San Diego County Office of Education will continue to provide educational services to those eligible students placed or referred to the Summit/Community School Program. A rereferral to the program may be necessary for acceptance.
- ➤ The Vista Unified School District will continue to use existing educational programs to meet the needs of its expelled students and utilized due process for each student who commits another expellable offense. This will allow the Administrative Hearing Panel and the Board of Trustees to determine a more appropriate educational placement.
- ➤ The County Office of Education and the Vista Unified School District will continue to explore collaborative alternatives to address this gap.
