




This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Vivian Banks Charter School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Vivian Banks Charter School is \$1,489,878.41, of which \$932,052.00 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$254,845.00 is other state funds, \$233,261.41 is local funds, and \$69,720.00 is federal funds. Of the \$932,052.00 in LCFF Funds, \$106,295.00 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).



Plan Summary [2023-2024]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

Vivian Banks is a very special place for learning. The setting is bucolic, with a magnificent view of snowcapped Palomar Mountain available most days and a rural setting that lends itself to a myriad of learning opportunities. It is on the grounds of the Pala Mission, an auxiliary site of the nearby San Luis Rey Catholic Mission. The School is named for Vivian Banks, a Native American who served on the Bonsall Unified School District Board of Trustees from 1944 to 1990.

As a small school VBCS is able to provide students an individualized and personal educational experience with small classroom sizes (average 17 students). Established in 2006, Vivian Banks Charter School has served generations of Pala families. Vivian Banks Charter School (VBCS) is located on the Pala Indian Reservation, within the Bonsall Unified School District (BUSD) existing boundaries.

The Vivian Banks Charter School is a learning community committed to the cultural awareness, social and physical development, and intellectual growth of each student. It establishes a learning environment that fosters respect for self and others, responsibility, and enables students to meet present needs and future challenges in a complex, changing society.

The VBCS educational program serves students with a diverse background and of all ability levels from kindergarten through fifth grade. Our students will be able to apply basic and higher order thinking skills, use technology, and develop effective interpersonal communication, particularly in the area of self-management. A variety of technologies are used to enhance teaching and learning. The school fosters unity by recognizing our common heritage and, within it, the unique contributions of each individual.

Currently our school serves approximately 89 students. VBCS demographic profile consists of 46% Native American, 42.6% Hispanic, 3% White, 7% Two or More Races. Our socio-economically disadvantaged subgroup is (60%), English Learners (21%), and Special Education (14%) subgroups are provided additional services targeted towards supporting them to reach their highest academic potential.

The following are the VBCS percentages of the four "high needs" student groups.

- 1. Socioeconomically Disadvantaged 60%
- 2. Homeless Youth 45%
- 3. English Learners 21%
- 4. Foster Youth 1%

The "unduplicated count" of students are those who (1) are English learners, (2) meet income or categorical eligibility requirements for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Program, or (3) are foster youth. "Unduplicated count" means that each student is counted only once even if the student meets more than one of these criteria (EC sections 2574(b)(2) and 42238.02(b)(1)). The VBCS unduplicated count is 73%.

We provide a wide array of academic support programs for children who require special assistance in mastering academic standards. A Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) is provided that includes an academic intervention program in English Language Arts and Math, Resource Specialist support, summer school, no cost before and after school programs (ASES/ELO-P), small class sizes, bilingual English Learner support, ELD teacher, Smart Boards, 1-1 Chromebooks in grades K-5, as well as extracurricular enrichment opportunities i.e. running club, student council, Native American language classes, parent classes, and After School Education and Safety Grant (ASES).

Vivian Banks also has part-time counselor to support students who need social/emotional and/or behavioral support. Depending on student need, the school counselor either provides one-on-one support or small group support focused on appropriate peer interactions. The school counselor also supports students in making positive choices as well as delivers push-in character lessons to all classrooms. VBCS staff not only cares about every child's academic achievement, but also their social and emotional development. We have clear guidelines for behaviors that are focused primarily on the Positive Behavior and Intervention Support framework.

The past five years have been challenging for the Vivian Banks community, beginning with the December 2017 Lilac fires that affected many families and staff. Additionally, the COVID-19 pandemic has been an ongoing challenge that has had a significant impact on our instructional programs. The safety and education of our students, staff, parents, and community is the highest priority of our Superintendent and the BUSD Leadership Team. VBCS parents and guardians are invaluable partners, essential to the health and success of the students and their schools. Accordingly, VBCS will foster and develop parent-support programs that reinforce communication, enrichment, and outreach efforts. These programs will help parents and guardians become strong education advocates and remain well informed about all educational opportunities for their student.

Reflections: Successes

A description of successes and/or progress based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

VBCS has prioritized increasing counseling support throughout the district, and we have partnered with Panorama Education to help us gather information about the experiences and perceptions that our staff, teachers, students, and families have about our schools. We have begun to use this information to help us identify strengths and areas for growth, especially in our multi-tiered systems of support.

We are incredibly proud that Vivian Banks Charter School was awarded the Purple Star award this year. The Purple Star Award from the State of California recognizes schools that provide outstanding support for military connected students and families. There are over 10,000 schools in California. Only 63 schools have been selected for this honor.

BUSD has formed an Equity Team to increase our collective understanding of cultural diversity and issues of equity that our students are facing. We aim to determine steps we can take together to mitigate these equity issues and ensure that all students are included, valued, and supported. In addition to attending the SDCOE Equity Conference, our Equity Team has met to reflect on data and the impact of belonging on our students and our culture. Bonsall Unified is honored to serve a significant population of students from the Pala Band of Mission Indians, and BUSD continues to foster a strong relationship with tribal leadership and with our families and students from our native population. We have collaborated with Tribal Council, SDSU, SDCOE, and CSUSM to seek new ways to support our American Indian students. Our team is working now to develop a professional development plan for our staff and to form both a TK-12 Native American Student Success PLC and a Native Learner Advisory Committee, in partnership with representatives from Pala Tribal Council, to support us in investigating equity perspectives for continuous improvement.

BUSD formed a District Writing Team to focus on aligning our approach to writing across the district. The team has developed common writing prompts and rubrics and identified common writing domains for each of the assessment windows. These developments are essential steps towards improving communication and collaboration among grade levels and towards strengthening vertical and horizontal articulation in the district.

Reflections: Identified Need

A description of any areas that need significant improvement based on a review of Dashboard and local data, including any areas of low performance and significant performance gaps among student groups on Dashboard indicators, and any steps taken to address those areas.

With the return of CAASPP testing in the Spring of 2022 and through reflection of local data, VBCS has been able to identify needs for significant improvement and areas of significant performance gaps among student groups. Based on the most recent CA Dashboard data and local data, VBCS results indicate the following needs:

- 1. Addressing the chronic absenteeism of Native Americans, English Learners, Homeless, and Students with Disabilities
- 2. Addressing the lower achievement in ELA of Native Americans, English Learners, Homeless, and Students with Disabilities
- 3 Addressing the lower achievement in Math of Native Americans, English Learners, Homeless, Students with Disabilities, and Socioeconomically disadvantaged students
- 4. Improve student belonging and connection to their school community. Results from Panorama surveys and from LCAP surveys indicate that 36% of respondents agree that our schools ensure students feel connected to their school community. 41% of respondents were neutral and 23% disagreed.
- 5. Improve systems of social, emotional, and mental health supports. Our students' social, emotional, and physical well-being continue to have an impact on academic performance for some students.

The LEA will take the following steps to address these areas of low performance and performance gaps:

- Strengthen supports and services for parents of English Learners
- Increase timely and accurate communication through public relations, weekly newsletters, updated websites
- Increase multi-tiered systems of support- through professional development, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support, trauma-informed practices, school intervention teams
- Provide funding for athletic and PE programs to increase involvement
- Allocate funding to support music and the arts districtwide
- Continue the work of districtwide Equity Team to address inequities and disproportionality
- Ensure intensive Tier 2 and 3 math and literacy supports
- Implement Uplift Literacy Grant Teacher and Coaching Academies and small group intervention
- Provide professional development in English Learner Road Map and designated and integrated ELD strategies, Native Ways of Knowing, data analysis to inform instruction, Orton Gillingham, 5 Dimensions of Teaching and Learning instructional framework
- Implement comprehensive K-12 writing program and common assessments
- Update library publications
- Offer summer intervention and enrichment opportunities at all levels
- Increase after school tutoring and enrichment

VBCS's 2023-2024 LCAP features a continuation of work to support students, staff, and families in various ways. BUSD will continue to prioritize providing access to highly rigorous coursework for all students in all grade levels. This includes the implementation of new NGSS-aligned and comprehensive elementary science curriculum, and the adoption of new History/Social Science curriculum that is aligned to the California History/Social Science Framework and CCSS standards. VBCS will provide continuous and in-depth professional development in newly purchased curriculum to ensure effective implementation.

VBCS will continue to support numerous actions to improve student success in ELA, math, science, and literacy. There will be an intentional focus on our unduplicated students with academic and social-emotional supports and program offerings to increase access and college and career readiness. VBCS will maintain an intentional focus on supporting all students, parents, and staff through improved engagement and involvement. VBCS recognizes that with the learning disruptions experienced by students in the past few years comes the need for learning recovery and all the associated actions, including additional social, emotional, and physical wellness supports. As part of this effort, VBCS will strengthen the supports and services for our parents of English Learners through engagement workshops, ELAC and DELAC meeting supports, increased translation services, and increased communication. BUSD has formed a district Equity Team that has begun to develop a districtwide Equity Plan. BUSD is collaborating with the SDCOE for guidance and professional development.

An important goal for VBCS is that all students will demonstrate academic growth in California State Standards core curricular areas across all grade levels. VBCS will continue to support a standards-based instructional program to meet the needs of our low-income, foster youth, English Learners, and students with unique needs. Components of this support will include professional development aligned to CA State standards for our teachers; technology refresh for student and staff computers; social-emotional supports, health supports, and after-school programming; increased ELA and Math Literacy supports, and an increased equity focus.

Staff are providing increased social and emotional support for students, more instructional support, and targeted academic intervention, and more connections for our families to engage and to receive help they need to support their students at home. VBCS has continued a targeted focus on ELA and math academic achievement. Using tools such as iReady, Lexia, and writing assessments, teachers have identified students at varying levels of achievement and have leveraged resources such as ST Math, Lexia Core 5, Lexia Power Up, and iReady to provide individualized instruction to address students' needs and support growth.

We saw impressive growth from Fall 22-23 to Winter 22-23 in iReady math and reading scores. In math, students demonstrated an increase from 5% proficient to 20% proficient. In reading, students demonstrated an increase from 7% proficient to 38% proficient. Professional development opportunities this year have included, but were not limited to, trauma informed practices, Orton-Gillingham early literacy strategies, alignment of

assessments and curriculum, implementation of History/Social Science pilot programs, Panorama SEL platform, Jane Schaffer writing program, Lexia Core 5 and Lexia Power Up strategies and usage, and iReady best practices.

VBCS is using Expanded Learning Opportunities Program funding to ensure we meet the requirements of the grant, especially with the focus on serving the needs of our unduplicated pupils. We have increased the funding for our after school program due to the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program funds that we are receiving. We have developed an ELO-P plan to address the needs of our students that was approved in June 2022 and has been implemented in 2022-2023.

Engaging Educational Partners

Essential to the success of this effort is the active participation of all stakeholders to maximize student engagement and learning. Parents, guardians, students, employee groups, administrators, and community members came together to thoughtfully and openly communicate about addressing and overcoming the challenges facing students today, especially those who are typically underserved and at risk. As a charter school within the Bonsall Unified School District, parents and staff of the Vivian Banks Charter school were also involved in the development of the Bonsall Unified School District Local Control Accountability Plan.

A significant effort this year to increase educational partner engagement and to deepen communication and collaboration has been the formation of our BUSD Design Team. During the 2022-2023 school year, BUSD formed a Design Team, a diverse group of educational partners, to help define our BUSD Framework for the Future. The Framework for the Future will provide a north star that defines the learner outcomes, learning experiences, and enabling conditions to inform decision-making and prioritization. Educational partner engagement for this work began with student forums conducted at each school site in September of 2022. Following these forums, the Design Team met on October 17, November 14, January 9, February 7, April 11, and May 9 to reflect on student voice and learner experience, define learner profile outcomes, finalize the BUSD Learner Profile, and prototype the BUSD Learning Model. In addition, feedback sessions were held at each school site in March and April to gather more input. The input and feedback gleaned through our Design Team work has been instrumental in guiding the goals, actions, and services in the VBCS LCAP.

VBCS was identified for Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI) specific to the following qualifying factors:

- 1. **Parent Workshops** Parent workshops will be offered to support unduplicated students specific to academic, SEL, attendance support at home.
- 2. **Increase Student Enrichment Opportunities -** Provide before and after school student enrichment opportunities including but not limited to visual and performing arts, student clubs, athletics, and leadership.
- 3. **Increase Community Events** VBCS will host a number of community events on campus with the goal of improving the school-home connection. i.e. Lunch on the Lawn events monthly with families that will include a community Fun Run, Christmas Performance, BBQ, Red Ribbon Week, Read Across America, Book Fairs...

- 4. **Analyze Attendance Data** Regular attendance review to identify students who had chronic absenteeism the previous year, as well as students at risk of chronic absenteeism.
- 5. Develop and Implement Tiered Intervention Strategies

Feedback from surveys was incorporated with ongoing input received from our specific groups that meet regularly (see groups listed above) to support the development of plans for our VBCS LCAP and for other funding that continues to be apportioned for our LEA under state and federal relief acts.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners.

Engaging educational partners is a high priority for Vivian Banks Charter School. Ongoing engagement is crucial to create mutually respectful, supportive, and collaborative environments. This engagement fosters meaningful dialogue that helps us collectively to determine goals and actions that lead to academic success for all students. Essential to the success of this effort is the active participation of all educational partners to maximize student engagement and learning. Parents, guardians, students, employee groups, administrators, and community members came together in a variety of ways to thoughtfully and openly communicate about addressing and overcoming the challenges facing students today, especially those who are typically underserved and at risk. The feedback they provide continues to support our Board adopted vision that includes five essential components: Comprehensive PK-12 Curriculum, Rigorous Instruction and Assessment, Collaboration, Safe and Orderly Schools, and Engaged Family and Community Involvement. These components are crucial to our mission to ensure we "Empower all students to achieve their maximum learning potential."

Our BUSD Design Team drafted our BUSD Learner Profile based on significant feedback from our educational partners. Our Learner Profile Outcomes include: Resilient Learner, Empathetic Collaborator, Engaged Community Member, Effective Communicator, Critical Thinker, and Problem Solver. These Learner Profile Outcomes provide a catalyst to align systems, processes, and structures necessary to support students in developing and demonstrating the outcomes.

Through our LCAP input meetings and surveys, we learned that there is support for continuing our current direction in some areas and improving in other areas. Related to Goal 3: 55% of educational partners in our LCAP survey agreed that student classwork is appropriate and rigorous, 72% agreed that our schools provide adequate access to needed technology, 57% agreed that our schools provide support for English Learner students and their individual needs, and 47% agreed that our schools provide intervention and enrichment activities to increase each student's individual academic achievement.

Related to Goal 2: 52% agreed that our schools create a welcoming environment for all families in the community, 50% agreed that our schools promote health and wellness for students, 54% agreed that our schools provide social-emotional support for student wellness, and 59% agreed that our schools communicate regularly with families.

Related to Goal 1: 57% agreed that our schools promote college and career readiness skills, college going culture, and leadership opportunities, 57% agreed that our secondary students are able to speak to counselors about college requirements, college/career planning, and personal issues, and 40% agreed that our schools provide systems and protocols for providing outreach to students and their families when they are not engaging in instruction.

Many respondents understand and recognize there continues to be a need for learning recovery.

A1 – As part of the PBIS framework, we have established clear rules for the behaviors we expect in all areas of our school. These expectations are explained in our Behavior Matrix. We teach these expectations to the students during classroom instruction and during our review activities. The expectations for all student behaviors will be clear throughout our classrooms, playground, lunchroom, cafeteria, bathrooms, and hallways. Our expectations will provide a school environment where more time is spent instructing and less time spent disciplining. By teaching the expected behaviors in a positive way, we are providing a common language for everyone in our building, including students, teachers, and staff. We believe that by helping students practice good behavior, we will build a school community where all students can learn.

- **A2,3** VBCS had a counselor on site 5 days a week. The Counselor provided individual counseling and small group counseling to at-risk students. The Counselor also pushes into every classroom weekly and provides SEL lessons utilizing the Second Step Curriculum. **A4** VBCS prioritized an emphasis on trauma informed practices to support students' social, emotional, and behavioral needs. Staff participated in trauma informed practices training through SDCOE and some followed up with further training in restorative practices. VBCS purchased and utilized Panorama software to help monitor students' academic, social, and emotional learning.
- **A5** Students are recognized weekly at our Friday Morning Flag Raising. Students are recognized for academic achievement, effort, attendance, leadership, and citizenship.

Student and parent engagement has long been a focus at Vivian Bans Charter School. VBCS believes when students, families, and community members take an active role in student learning, students will improve their academic performance, are more likely to persist through academic struggles, earn higher standardized test scores, have better social skills, and are less likely to drop out of school.

Research has historically indicated strong correlations between student/family engagement and student achievement. These correlations remain strong for all levels of instruction, across all subject areas, and for varying instructional activities. The importance of student/family engagement cannot be underestimated – engagement affects student achievement, students' futures and can potentially help close COVID-19 learning gaps

- A1 Parent Workshops dedicated to supporting students at home were incorporated into existing ELAC and Charter Council meetings.
- A3 Additional staffing for ELO-P/ASES was delayed due to a lack of applicants.

A1 - \$500 was budgeted for Parent Workshops, this expenditure did not occur.

- **A1** The addition of a Family and Community Liaison for the district has been a significant improvement, as she has been actively engaging school communities through education and cultural events to increase visibility and participation.
- **A2** VBCS has made significant efforts to ensure timely and accurate website information and communications with parents and families. VBCS sends weekly newsletters using the Smore platform, which has greatly improved overall school family communication. The Superintendent sends regular community updates sharing progress of our district, celebrations of our students and programs, and announcements for upcoming events and opportunities. Families are surveyed using the Panorama platform and using Google forms to receive input on priorities and concerns, and to provide feedback on communications. Improving the quality and consistency of our website will be an increased focus in the next year.

- A3 The VBCS ASES program is filled to capacity and will be expanding to serve 60 students next year. ASES will also serve as our ELO-P program. VBCS also used ELO monies to provide afterschool enrichment specific to performing arts. VBCS added a Folklorico Dance Team as well as produced a student play after school.
- A4, A7 VBCS continues to provide a host of cultural events on campus to recognize and celebrate our student's heritage. We hosted a Native American Day celebration and art show as well as a Hispanic Heritage day featuring our student Folkloric Dance Team. VBCS also continues to offer Native Language (Cupeno) instruction to all students.

- A2 VBCS now provides weekly music instruction to all students.

Our charge as school leaders at Vivian Banks Charter School is to increase student achievement. However, when our measurements of students is limited to achievement of grade level proficiency on an annual basis we learn only whether or not he or she is meeting grade-level expectations at that moment of time. By measuring how much a school's students learn over the course of a school year, we can get a much clearer picture of the school's impact.

By measuring student growth data VBCS educators are able to better pinpoint whether specific instructional strategies or interventions are effective and make adjustments in real-time over the course of the school year. Individual student growth data can also provide positive feedback to students, encouragement, and recognition as they move closer towards or beyond grade level proficiency.

Targeted actions have been developed to support Goal #3. The actions aligned with these areas will promote increased student academic achievement for each student at VBCS and close the achievement gap among our unduplicated and underrepresented students.

- A1- VBCS has continued a targeted focus on ELA and math academic achievement. Using tools such as iReady, Lexia, and writing assessments, teachers have identified students at varying levels of achievement and have leveraged resources such as ST Math, Lexia Core 5 and i-Ready to provide individualized instruction to address students' needs and support growth. We saw impressive growth from Fall 22-23 to Winter 22-23 in i-Ready math and reading scores in K-5. In reading, students demonstrated an increase from 7% proficient to 38% proficient. In math, students demonstrated an increase from 5% proficient to 20% proficient.
- **A2** Professional opportunities this year have included, but were not limited to, trauma informed practices, Orton-Gillingham early literacy strategies, alignment of assessments and curriculum, implementation of science pilot programs, Panorama SEL platform, Jane Schaffer writing program, Lexia Core 5 and Power Up strategies and usage, and iReady best practices.
- A4 Our ELD Teacher has worked extensively with our General Ed. teachers to provide guidance and direction on the services we are

providing our English Learners through both integrated and designated ELD and to align these services with the California English Learner Roadmap.

After assessing the needs, conditions, and circumstances of our low-income students, we learned that the attendance rate of our low-income students is 7 percent lower than the attendance rate for all students. (Needs, Conditions, Circumstances [Principally Directed])

In order to address this condition of our low-income students, we will develop and implement a new attendance program that is designed to address some of the major causes of absenteeism, including lack of reliable transportation and food, as well as a school climate that does not emphasize the importance of attendance. Goal N, Actions X, Y, and Z provide additional transportation and nutritional resources as well as a districtwide educational campaign on the benefits of high attendance rates. (Contributing Action[s])

These actions are being provided on an LEA-wide basis and we expect/hope that all students with less than a 100 percent attendance rate will benefit.
